TECHNIQUE TIP: Silk

Legend has it that the Empress His Ling Shi of China discovered silk when she was sitting in her garden drinking

tea back in the 27 century B.C. A cocoon fell off of the mulberry tree into her cup and the hot water made it start to unwind in a long fine thread. Her husband, the Yellow Emperor gave her a grove of mulberry trees so she could cultivate the silk worm. She is also credited for creation of the silk reel which joins the fine filaments into a thread strong enough to weave and the silk loom. And so sericulture began. The Bombyx Mori moth is the most common silk worm that is used for commercial silk. The adult life is very short. A female moth will lay 300-400 eggs 2 days after it emerges from its cocoon and then die. These eggs hatch in about 10 days and the larva eat continually for up to six weeks. They will grow from 1/4" up to 3" long over this time consuming mulberry leaves. The caterpillar stops eating and turns color. Then it spins its cocoon in 3 days. An adult moth emerges after 21 days but thread makers don't want the adult to come out as this will make a hole in the end disturbing the continuous strand. So the cocoons are treated with hot air, steam or boiling water to loosen the serin so the strand will unwind. Each cocoon can make a filament as long as a kilometer. It takes 2500 cocoons to make a pound of raw silk. 4-6 cocoons are reeled together to make one thread. China kept the silk making process a secret for 3000 years. If anyone was caught trying to smuggle cocoons or silk worms out of the country they were executed. The trade route called the Silk Road opened when China began to export their silk products eventually all the way to the Mediterranean. Silk was highly prized, regulated and used only by the imperial family for many years. During the Han Dynasty it was used to pay government officials and the length of silk cloth became a monetary standard. Silk cultivation spread to Japan around 300AD and by 522 the Byzantines as well. Arabs and Crusaders brought silk production to Western Europe especially Italy and France. The Industrial Revolution changed much of Europe's silk industry due to innovations in spinning cotton, which was much less costly to make. China is now once again the world's largest producer of silk. Because of its natural protein structure, silk is the most hypoallergenic of all fabrics. Its temperature - regulating properties give silk the ability to warm and cool simultaneously. It is warm in the cool weather and comfortably cool in hotter temps. Silk can absorb up to 30% of its weight in moisture without feeling damp. Its smooth surface resists soil and odors and is wrinkle and tear resistant. Silk takes colors well and mixes well with other animal and vegetable fibers. It is easy to work with in textile work and is luxuriously soft and has lustrous beauty. 


CLASSES: If you would like to learn some specific technique or work on a specific project, let me know. We will schedule a custom class at your time choice and expertise level.

These are some of the classes we have offered before: counted cross-stitch, beyond cross-stitch which would include adding specialty stitches, stamped cross-stitch/embroidery, canvaswork - needlepoint, hardanger, pulled thread, drawn thread, bargello, petite point on silk gauze, knotted work, smocking, temari balls, knitting, crochet, duplicate stitch, myreshka drawn work, tatting, bridge stitching (darning stitch), beadwork (peyote, herringbone, right angle weave, square stitch, brick stitch), huck embroidery (Swedish weaving), Brazilian embroidery, silk ribbon embroidery, punch needle, locker hook, stumpwork, blackwork, beginning piecing for quilting, paper piecing for quilting, fusible applique, crazy quilts, bargello quilts, felt applique, free lace for scarves/shawls, framing and mounting tips, finishing pillows, finishing standups, finishing in a box shape, tassels, etuis, stitch notebooks. 
